The Bundaberg Rates Consortium are still working hard to achieve a fairer outcome for rate payers. Tanya Howard, Bundaberg CANEGROWERS, Bree Grima, Bundaberg Fruit and Vegetable Growers, Angela Williams, CANEGROWERS Isis and Tom Marland, AgForce travelled to Brisbane to meet with Deputy Premier Steven Miles to further pursue a ruling from the State Government and a suitable outcome for all rate payers.

I have written to the Bundaberg Regional Council requesting the following:

'That the Category 9 ratepayers are refunded the rate rises that they suffered from the 2020/2021 budget such that the increase is no more than CPI and that going forward the Council adheres to the 'Guideline on the equity and fairness in rating Queensland local governments'.

Apart from our core business of managing the Cane Supply agreement I have listed the top issues I think we collectively face below:

- Reef Regulations
- Rates and Local Government
- Water access security and pricing
- Affordable electricity supply

We will be holding a series of member only shed meetings on 3 June 2021 to talk about these issues, what we are doing and what you think we could be doing that we are not.

You will receive an invitation with times and the locations within the next couple of weeks to discuss these issues with you.

I am keen to hear your thoughts and ideas and any other issues that you have, see you all there.



he Mill will be running in continuous crushing mode this year.

As such the Continuous Crushing Allowance (19. 3 (a) and (b) will apply:

19. 3 Allowances

(a) Continuous Crushing Allowance

The Mill Owner will pay a Continuous Crushing Allowance for cane harvested on a weekend for supply to each Mill operating in continuous mode based on the following principles:

- \$0.70/tonne
- the allowance will be shared equally (cents/tonne) across all cane delivered by all growers to Mills while they are operating in continuous mode
- the allowance will be included with the final pay
- the allowance increases or decreases in proportion to movements in the sugar price above and below \$330 per tonne

(b) Harvesting Allowance

When a Mill is operating in a continuous mode the Mill Owner will pay Growers supplying a Mill in continuous mode a Harvesting Allowance for cane harvested on a weekend based on the following principles:

- the allowance is \$0.80 per tonne for cane harvested on weekends
- the allowance will be included with the delivery pay, except where a Grower has given authorisation, the allowance will be paid to the particular harvesting contractor on a weekly basis
- the allowance will be adjusted on 1 April according to the movement in the minimum weekly wage rate for a cane harvesting employee (Level 1) under the Sugar Industry Award 2010 for the previous twelve (12) months

The adjusted Harvesting Allowance for the 2021 season will be \$1.14 per tonne for cane harvested on weekends.

Base CCS

Base CCS has not yet been agreed however, for the past four (4) seasons we have started at 13.3 and adjusted as necessary, when necessary.

Haulage Allowance

The Haulage Allowance is increased by CPI each year. The All Groups CPI Index weighted average of eight (8) capital cities is 1.1% for the year. The 1.1% increase on last year's allowances is shown in the following table.

Cane Fire Notice for burning tops and trash

Before growers burn cane or trash this season they need to ensure they are following the conditions of the Cane Burning Notice or the conditions on their permit before any cane or trash is burnt. Failure to do this leaves growers exposed to legal action.

To burn cane or trash under the Notice, all conditions of the Notice need to be met. This includes notifying neighbours, number of people in attendance and the types of equipment in attendance. Also to use the Notice with the property neighbouring a road, the road must be a local road according to the QFES Fire Warden Finder mapping service. If a fire is to occur on a farm that borders a main road, according to the Fire Warden Finder mapping service, any fire on that farm requires a permit not just those blocks against the road.

If growers are unsure if they can comply with the Notice and to avoid any confusion growers should apply for a permit from their fire warden for any cane or trash fires. Information about the Notice and all the relevant links including a fact sheet can be found at https://www.ruralfire.qld.gov.au/Using_Fire_Outdoors/Pages/Cane-Burning-Notification.aspx

The weather conditions and smoke hazard signs do go together as no burning is to be conducted if the smoke is to become a hazard on local and main roads as well as highways. A smoke hazard sign is to be erected if the area to be burnt adjoins or is within 100m of a road of any description. Smoke Hazard signs are available from some of the wardens as well as the QFES Rural Fire Bundaberg office. Due to COVID-19 restrictions it would be best to make initial contact by phone on (07) 4154 6120 to make arrangements to collect the signs.

Growers need to contact Firecom on 1800 354 621 before any fire is lit, whether it is under the Notice or a permit to assist QFES with calls from the public and identifying uncontrolled fires

Neighbours are to be notified of growers' intention to burn at the beginning of the season and again prior to the burn so they can make preparations to minimise the impact of smoke and ash. Bundaberg Area Director Bruce Thompson has offered the resources of QFES Rural Fire Division to assist with keeping the community informed, especially for

those who have an urban or peri-urban group of neighbours.

Contact with the OFES Rural Fire Bundaberg office can be made via (07) 4154 6120 and a request for a community message can be posted indicating an approximate time for burning and any potential issues such as smoke across a road. In situations where farms neighbour a large number of residences, provided there is enough notice, the Bundaberg Rural Fire Brigade may be able to use its' community resource to notify the neighbours. Sample letters of an intention to apply for a fire permit and intention to burn are available at reception of Bundaberg CANEGROWERS.

If growers are unable to comply with the Notice they are still able to get a permit to burn from their local warden and follow the conditions of the permit to burn cane, trash and tops.

How to check your employee's drivers licence status

Did you know that you can check if a Queensland driver licence is current by using the Queensland Transport online service found at https:// www.service.transport.qld.gov.au/ checkdriverlicencestatus

To check the status of a licence you will

need the:

- Driver licence number
- Licence holder's first and last name
- Licence holder's date of birth

The service is intended for use by the licence holder, or persons who have been provided the driver licence as

evidence of the licence holder's authority to drive.

The service only checks the status of a driver licence. It will not check the driver licence class or type, or any special conditions imposed on the licence.

Member Only Crop Insurance

All Bundaberg CANEGROWERS members have crop insurance cover as part of their membership fee. This year the cover is set at \$40 per tonne with a fifty (50) tonne excess and covers growers for:

- total crop loss from unharvested cane after a fire,
- partial crop loss from reduced yield of a harvested crop after a fire and
- the loss of a trash blanket and the

costs of re-establishing the crop after the fire in the trash blanket.

Growers are able to apply to "Top Up" their insurance beyond \$40 per tonne with the payment of additional premium.

This option may be used if growers have some significantly higher priced forward pricing locked in for this year. Before applying for the Top Up insurance growers also need to be aware that the underwriters liability under the Fire Perils Crop Insurance policy is the maximum value of indemnity selected or 90% of the value of the cane at the mill, whichever is the lesser amount.

Top Up insurance can be applied for by contacting Bundaberg CANEGROWERS on (07) 4151 2555, completing the Top Up Insurance document and paying the additional premium. Growers are also able to reduce the fifty (50) tonne excess by paying an additional premium.

Reimbursement of Burnt Cane Deduction

The Collective Agreement has a clause, which enables reimbursement of the burnt cane penalty, i.e.

10.5 Where the Grower makes a written application to the Mill Owner for reimbursement of the burnt cane deduction and it is the Mill Owner's opinion that the cane was burnt in order to improve cane quality or increase

productivity, the Mill Owner shall reimburse the burnt cane deduction of 9.8 cents to the grower for cane delivered on or before the second day after burning.

If you wish to claim reimbursement you need to apply to Bundaberg Sugar in writing.

You may wish to use the pro forma shown or collect one from reception.

If you have applied for reimbursement in previous seasons you are not required to do so again.



Safety near powerlines

Growers are reminded that powerlines have a general three (3) metre exclusion zone around the wires and the safest way to operate around the wires is to have a trained safety observer watching the operation of the machinery and the wires. The exclusion zone can be reduced if a trained observer (completed Safe Working Near Exposed Live Parts course or similar) is used at the site where equipment may encroach the three (3) metre exclusion zone.

What to do if contact occurs with powerlines

If equipment touches a powerline growers are to stay inside the cab of the vehicle. The only reason to leave is if the vehicle is on fire. If forced to leave the cab, the best thing to do is to jump as far away from the vehicle as possible, landing with your two (2) feet close together to prevent creating a circuit with your legs. Then continue to hop away keeping your feet together.

Another option is to shuffle away keeping your feet together, constant contact with the ground, and get at least 8-10 metres away from the vehicle.

By having your feet apart you've got one foot on the 9,000 volt line and the other foot on the 8,000 volt line, the electricity will flow through your body causing electric shock and possible injury or death.



Farm Safety during the harvest

With the crushing beginning shortly, growers are reminded of the need to provide a safe place to work for themselves, employees, family members and the harvesting crews who operate on their farm.

It is easy to get complacent, especially as growers live and work on the farm each day and may have had the same harvesting crew for 20 years or more. Each year growers need to take stock of what is on the farm, what has changed and does this impact the harvesting crews who will be working on the farm.

For example a new lateral move irrigator may mean new hydrant locations as well as the parking of the

irrigator in a paddock or on a headland where a harvester or haulout may encounter it in the early morning.

As part of providing a safe place to work, it is recommended that growers complete an induction for the harvesting crew and any regular visitors such as chemical and fertiliser delivery drivers.

For the harvesting crew, items such as hydrants, power poles, powerlines, tram lines, and parked equipment are vitally important to be identified as part of the induction process. The delivery drivers need to be inducted to the hazards around the sheds or delivery points such as access points/doorways to buildings, powerlines, and contact details if no one

is at the shed. The important thing is that these are updated if there are any changes (e.g. if the lateral move irrigator has been moved so that the remainder of the farm can be harvested).

The Managing Sugarcane Farm Safety manual is available from Bundaberg CANEGROWERS reception. The workbook has a checklist that enables growers to identify hazards and provide a risk assessment that enables plans to be made that provide a safe place to live and work on the farm. Completing the relevant sections is the first step to demonstrating a commitment to workplace safety, which is especially important if there is a workplace incident on the farm.

Casuals - Recent Fair Work Changes



As part of the changes made to the Fair Work Act on 27 March 2021, the Fair Work Ombudsman has published the first version of the *Casual Employment Information Statement* (CEIS).

You should already be familiar with the *Fair Work Information Statement* (*FWIS*), which, as per Section 125 of the Fair Work Act, an employer must give each employee the Fair Work Information Statement before, or as soon as practicable after, the employee starts employment.

The changes to the Fair Work Act that passed late in March 2021 add to this Section and creates a second Information Statement, one that is specifically for Casuals. This Casual Employment Information Statement must be given to casual employees in addition to them receiving the Fair Work Information Statement.

Effective from 27 March 2021:

1. You should ensure that this paperwork is included as part of your onboarding procedures, ensuring that:

- All Employees must receive the Fair Work Information Statement upon commencing work with an employer or as soon as practicable after starting.
- All Casual Employees must receive both the Fair Work Information Statement and the Casual Employment Information Statement upon commencing or as soon as practicable after starting.
- 2. For existing casual staff within your business: Small business employers (with under 15 staff) are required to provide casual employees with a copy of this Casual Employment

Information Statement now, and other businesses are encouraged to provide a copy now, but required to provide a copy by no later than 27 September 2021.

Loading of cane bins

Growers are reminded to ensure that the harvesting contractors fulfil their obligations relating to the securing of their load during the harvesting and upcoming planting season. With significantly more cane travelling along the road network this year growers and harvester contractors will need to be vigilant to ensure the cane bins are not overloaded.

By law, the person in control of the vehicle must ensure that the load is not placed in a way that makes the vehicle unstable or unsafe; it must be secured so it is unlikely to fall or be dislodged from the vehicle and an appropriate method must be used to restrain the load. Fines do apply for breaches.

The practicalities of the sugar cane harvest mean that sensible solutions need to occur so that billets are not spilt on the road. These practicalities lead to the adoption of specific guidelines for operation on or near the road network, based on the premise of minimising the spilling of billets onto the road. These guidelines "2013 Guidelines for Loading of Sugar Industry Cane Haulage Units for Travel on Public Roads" must be adhered to by cane operators, including the loader (harvester driver) to ensure that bins are correctly and appropriately filled.

Under the Chain of Responsibility legislation, it is not only the driver of the haulout/ multilift vehicle that spills the billets who is liable if spillage occurs and there is a risk to another motorist, it may also include the harvester driver, the owner of the bin used to haul cane as well as anyone else who has influence over the work that lead to the billets being spilt.

The "2013 Guidelines for Loading of Sugar Industry Cane Haulage Units for Travel on Public Roads" publication is

available through the Bundaberg CANEGROWERS website www.bdbcanegrowers.com.au on the Fact Sheet page under News & Media tab heading. This publication outlines the requirements for the loading of cane bins including that freeboard room is sufficient so that any settlement is contained within the bin and that any spillages on or near the road are cleaned up by the operators of the vehicle. This document will be updated shortly and will have a few minor changes. Please keep a watch out for the updated version to make sure everyone is following the latest guidelines.

 - Business Boost grants of up to \$15,000 will help small businesses to improve their efficiency and productivity through organisational development and upgrades through automated software and CRM systems. Grants can be used for website development and upgrades, strategic marketing, training and coaching, advisory services and planning for business continuity and succession. Applications to open late July 2021.
- **Business Growth Fund grants of up** to \$50,000 will allow businesses to buy highly specialised equipment to seize and accelerate growth opportunities. Applications to open 11 May 2021, with Guidelines available from 1 May.

Oueensland ChemClear collections


rowers are reminded to register for Ithe upcoming ChemClear muster to remove deregistered or unwanted chemicals from their chemical storage shed.

This is especially relevant for anyone with Shirtan left in their chemical storage as it is now deregistered and will become illegal to have in your possession after 26 May. I believe if it is registered for collection using Chemclear you will be covered until the collection date.

There will be a fee for the disposal of some chemicals while others will be free. The easiest way to determine this is to register the chemicals online and it will tell you if any fees apply.

SUGAR SERVICES NEWS

Ratoon Stunting Disease (RSD)

Ratoon stunting disease is still one of the major diseases affecting the industry and can cause yield losses from 5-60% depending on variety susceptibility and weather conditions. Average yield losses can be around the 15-20% mark.

Over the past couple of seasons we have seen a marked increase in the number of positive samples in plant sources compared to blocks tested in the district survey which include both plant and ration blocks.

There are a few things contributing to this increase, poor hygiene practices, plant sources not checked, using other sources (eg. Older ratoons). Over the next couple of weeks we will be commencing a district survey testing blocks for the presence of RSD and running through to the end of crushing season. During this testing period we will also be testing blocks/sources of planting material you would likely use for the upcoming spring planting season. RSD can be managed by good hygiene measures (disinfecting all harvesting and planting equipment) and using clean approved seed cane that has been tested.

One-Eye sett propagation

ver the past two (2) years (2019-2020) Bundaberg Sugar Services Ltd have invested in setting up and refining the One-Eye sett propagation system to supply growers with another option for purchasing approved seed cane along with the current system of tissue culture or whole-stalk cane.

Since the inception of this alternate approved seed cane option some 93,528 seedlings have been propagated and purchased by growers over this period. Grower feedback on seedling quality has been positive.

Orders can be placed at any time throughout the year and once orders have been received they can be ready for planting in eight (8) weeks.

Bundaberg Sugar Services now have a water wheel planter available which growers can borrow to plant their seedlings. To date ten (10) growers have taken up the option of using the planter and the interest in its use is increasing.

SUGAR SERVICES NEWS

Ratoon Stunting Disease Management (RSD) Recommended Farm Hygiene Practices

Planting

- Have <u>all</u> planting material inspected by Sugar Services staff before cutting plants.
- Sterilise all cutting equipment including cane knives, plant cutters, chainsaws, topping knives, plants harvester, tipper bins.
- Check that all plants coming onto the farm have also been inspected.
- Thoroughly sterilise the cutting gear and shutes of the planter before planting. The most effective method is to wash thoroughly and then apply a sterilising agent (Mirrol, cane knife steriliser) the day before planting commences.
- Sterilise the planter <u>especially</u> before planting kilogram and nucleus plants. If you are planting kilogram/nucleus plants and other plants, plant the kilogram/nucleus plants <u>first</u>.
- If you make a major variety change, when planting a block with two or more commercial varieties, sterilise between varieties.
- Should you run out of clean plants before completing a block, <u>do not</u> finish off with 'anything handy'. Check out another reliable source with a good history of hot water treatment.
- When billet planting, thoroughly clean and sterilise the cane harvester and tipper bins before use.

Harvesting

- Insist the harvester is sterilised when it comes onto your farm. The base-cutters, butt-lifters, chopper blades and box, and extractors should be thoroughly cleaned (preferably with a pressure cleaner) and a sterilant applied. Best way do it yourself.
- Sterilise also between blocks, especially when moving from an old ratoon to plant cane or first ratoon.
- Take special care to sterilise when moving from a known diseased block or one suspected of having RSD.
- Spray or sluice the more accessible parts of the harvester (basecutter, buttlifters, feed train chopper blades etc) with a sterilising agent after harvest each day.

Extras

- Destroy all volunteer stools during the fallow as they may harbour disease.
- Wash down and sterilise implements used to' take out' a diseased block eg bumper disc, rotary hoe.
- If employing a planting contractor, check each point of hygiene before planting commences.

Sterilising solution

Cane Knife steriliser – 1% solution (100mls/10ltrs water).
