With the harvesting in full swing, there are quite a lot of positives to take into account.

The weather has been reasonably kind with a welcome rainfall event, even if it had to wait until the harvest started. Some cool weather has helped to get the CCS to start rising, and now some fine weather to help us get the crop to the mill. On top of that, the sugar price has been heading upwards for a while now and hopefully it continues.

The final pay for the 2020 season went into grower's accounts on 26 July and full details of the final price and pools are on page 3.

Bundaberg Sugar put out a tranche recently and the 2022 season target price of \$495 has been achieved already. There was not a lot of interest from growers and I suspect that this is due to the low announced allocation in the Burnett surface water scheme and groundwater system.

The mill seems to have settled down and while the road transport system for Bingera cane has been fair there have been a few issues. Because of the way cane is transported there have been more dry samples than is acceptable. On page 2 there is an explanation from Matt Curtis that outlines the situation and a potential fix.

For those ex Bingera growers please (where possible) consign cane in multiples of three (3) for each con note. Lost time to date is

around 11.2 days made up of 6.5 wet weather days, one (1) day of scheduled stops and the balance mill downtime and other issues. By our estimate, the average hourly rate inclusive of wet weather is around 224 tonnes cane per hour and mill reliability is sitting at around 91%. This should see a 22 November finish if there are no major upsets.

## The top five (5) issues we have been dealing with over the last month are:

- 1. Ensuring that the Cane Analysis
  Program is being implemented and that
  issues are being resolved promptly and
  as per the program.
- 2. Working with QSL and Bundaberg Sugar to potentially allow Bundaberg growers to access the QSL Direct pricing platform.
- 3. The next rates bill is hitting our mailboxes now and Mayor Jack Dempsey and his Councilors' have, and still have, a choice around these rates rises on farmland. They didn't have to apply them, and they can choose to reverse them. We will be continuing the fight against unfair rate increases on your behalf with the alliance of AgForce, BFVG and CANEGROWERS Leis
- 4. Helping growers with electricity tariff selection to optimise affordability.
- 5. Negotiating and administering the contract between growers and ORECO for the supply of cane trash. ■

Our friends in the commercial fishing industry have requested that we bring to your attention a petition that has been put forward by Shane Snow, Vice President, Queensland Seafood Industry Association. The situation that they are in is similar to the battle we are having with reef regulations in that decisions are being made by people who do not live in the region, without adequate consultation, and based on dubious science.

If we are to get sensible outcomes for sustainable regional primary

production industries then we need to be supporting each other. If you wish to lend your support then please access the petition via https://www.parliament.qld.gov.au/work-of-assembly/petitions/petition-details? id=3588.

Queensland residents draw to the attention of the House that the seafood catching sector has lost confidence in the management of our fisheries resources. Our loss of confidence is based on the potential collective loss of access to our marine resources for recreational and commercial fishers and the Queensland community. An important example of this loss of confidence is the potential loss of, or extremely restricted access to, the Queensland Spanish Mackerel fishery to both recreational and commercial fishers and critically, the Queensland community.

Your petitioners, therefore, request the House to call for a full commission of inquiry into the management of Fisheries Queensland.

#### DRY SAMPLES AT MILLAQUIN MILL

There are an increased number of dry samples being experienced for cane being transported by roll on roll off trucks.

This is being caused by two (2) main factors:

- Con notes not being loaded in multiples of three (3).
- Light bin weights where a three (3) bin sample does not weigh fifteen (15) tonnes.

This system relies on bins being grouped in multiples of three (3) (carrying capacity of a truck). A valid sample requires a minimum of three (3) bins and fifteen (15) tonnes.

Where a grower loads a one (1) bin or two (2) bin multiple on a con note it will result in a dry sample – this will have a knock on effect to other con notes until the cane is cleared for that day.

The majority of growers are loading in three (3) bin multiples – it is the knock on effect that is causing so many dry samples.

We plan to take the following action:

- 1. Reinforce with harvesters and growers to load in three (3) bin multiples.
- 2. Where we get ones (1's) and twos (2's) we will cut these from the rake, store them separately and bring them in at the end of each day as a dry sample rake.

### Changes to the use of Dangerous Poisons

There has been a recent change to the Chemical Usage (Agricultural and Veterinary) Control Regulations by the Queensland Government which impacts growers. The change is to the minimum training requirements for users of Dangerous Poisons (Schedule 7 or S7) poisons which came into effect on 19 June 2021.

The change is that anyone <u>using</u> agricultural chemical products

containing S7 poisons must now have a statement of attainment for two (2) units of competency: AHCCHM304—Transport and store chemicals and AHCCHM307—Prepare and apply chemicals to control pest, weeds and diseases (or their equivalents). These two (2) units of competency are covered in Chemcert or equivalent chemical accreditation training. Previously people applying these products could have been under the supervision of someone with

these qualifications, however now the person applying the chemical must have the qualifications.

The most common active ingredients of cane based products that are S7 poisons are Paraquat, Diquat, and MSMA products which are commonly known as Gramoxone, SpraySeed, Reglone and Daconate.

#### Steel Tracked harvesters when travelling on the road

There has been an update on the requirements for Steel tracked cane harvesters when crossing roads. Steel tracked harvesters with conditional registration (LO6) which need to cross public roads or travel on the road reserve (the road) now require a NHVR permit. For those without this, there could well be an issue with 3rd party insurance cover. Access was previously provided by TMR with an Approval for

Tracked Cane Harvesting Equipment to cross State Controlled Roads which is no longer the case. The cost for this annual NHVR permit is \$75.

Permits are required to cross both State controlled roads as well as council controlled roads with permission sort from the relevant road authority. The permission is requested by NHVR on behalf of the applicant.

If you require a permit you can apply for a permit with NHVR. If you do not have an account growers will need to set one up on the NHVR portal. If you require assistance in applying for a permit after setting up the portal please contact Matt Leighton on 4151 2555 or 0437 084 035.

### Amount of coral on the reef at a record high


Bundaberg CANEGROWERS provided support to Katter Party Member, Nick Dametto in the pursuit of reversing the Environmental Protection (Great Barrier Reef Protection Measures) and Other Legislation Amendment Bill 2019 that included the Burnett Mary region in the "Reef Regulation" process for the first time in 2019.

Our inclusion is scientifically unjustifiable as the Burnett Mary River catchments are outside the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park. It is 70km from the mouth of the Burnett River to the most southern part of the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park.

Furthermore, the Bureau of Meteorology current forecasting models show that the ocean currents flow south and it is physically IMPOSSIBLE for any nutrients or sediment from the Burnett Mary to impact the Reef, which again, is 70km to the north!

The latest evidence showing that we are having absolutely no impact on the Reef comes from a recent report with the latest data from the Australian Institute of Marine Science (AIMS). In this report the Capricorn Bunkers, which is the nearest group of Reefs to the Burnett, are at a RECORD HIGH in coral cover levels and approximately twice the coral cover percentage of the rest of the Reef.

Australian Institute of Marine Science surveys over one hundred (100) reefs every year, and have reported that the amount of coral on the Reef is at record high levels.



#### 2020 Season Final Pool Prices

The final 'Net IPS Price' for the 2020 Season US Quota Pool under the Export RSSA was set at \$703.49 per tonne IPS after deducting the value of the Shared Pool Element attributed to the US Quota Pool (\$78.98 per tonne IPS). Based on the quantity of Raw Sugar Bundaberg Sugar Limited supplied to Queensland Sugar Limited and the quantity of Bundaberg Sugar Limited's domestic production for the 2020 Season, the value of the US Quota premium has been calculated at \$10.57 per Tonne IPS. The IPS Conversion Factor for the 2020 Season Harvest Pool under the Export RSSA is 1.0367.

The individual components attributable to the various pools to be set by Bundaberg Sugar Limited are set out in the following table:

To be eligible, you must be over the age of 18, and relocate at least ninety (90) minutes from you current location to a regional, remote or harvest area and take up short term agricultural work.

### Time to review your WH&S Plan for COVID-19

It has been twelve (12) months since Bundaberg CANEGROWERS provided you with a Work Health and Safety Plan for COVID-19 to assist with meeting your COVID-19 and Work Health and Safety requirements.

As with any compliance documents, we recommend that you undertake a review of your documents and associated

practices to ensure that activities and controls are still current to the workplace and Government guidelines.

# 2021 COVID-19 Business Support Grants for lockdown - impacted businesses in Queensland

Your business may be eligible for financial support through the 2021 COVID-19 Business Support Grants. \$5,000 grants will be made available to small and medium businesses across Queensland affected by the COVID-19 lockdown that commenced on Saturday 31 July 2021 and lockdowns in other states.

The Queensland Government recognises the short interval between lockdowns in South East Queensland, and the unique circumstances faced by regional economies who are impacted by multiple border closures. These \$5,000 grants will provide cash flow support for businesses to help them adapt to evolving circumstances.

#### Available funding

You may be eligible to receive a grant of \$5,000 (excluding GST). This grant

may be used for business expenses.

#### Eligibility criteria

The grant provides support to employing small and medium businesses across Queensland impacted by the South East Queensland lockdown that commenced on 31 July 2021. Your business doesn't have to be located in South East Queensland, but you must have experienced at least a 30% reduction in turnover as a result of the lockdown.

Small and medium businesses are defined as having:

- A turnover of more than \$75,000 per annum
- An annual payroll in Queensland of up to \$10 million.

More information on eligibility criteria will be available shortly.

Applications will open in mid-August.

You will need to apply online with supporting evidence. Grants will be processed in the order they are received. You will be paid the grant funds within two (2) weeks of being notified that your application has been approved.

# Seatbelts and mobile phone detection cameras now live across Queensland

pepartment of Transport and Main Roads' (TMR) new portable and static mobile phone and seatbelt detection cameras are now operating across Queensland.

Queensland is leading the way with this new technology using cameras to detect seatbelt offences is an Australian first, and they are an important tool in the fight to keep the community safe on the roads. Using a phone illegally while driving is as dangerous as drink driving, and an alarming number of drivers admit to not wearing a seatbelt.

These behaviours contribute significantly to the number of lives lost and serious injuries on Queensland roads each year.

Initially, there will be a three (3) month warning period when motorists caught committing offences on camera will not be issued penalties. Instead, registered owners will receive a warning letter encouraging them to change their behaviour. During this period, police will continue roadside enforcement, with the usual penalties applying.

Queensland Police Service (QPS) have also strengthened the road rules relating to mobile phone use - a driver must not have a mobile phone in their hand or resting on any part of their body, including their lap, while driving – regardless of whether the phone is on or in use.

From 1 November, penalties will apply to those caught by the cameras and include:

- \$1,033 fine and four (4) demerit points for illegal mobile phone use.
- \$413 fine and three (3) demerit points for failing to wear a seatbelt. Drivers can also be fined a further \$413 and three (3) demerit points for each passenger not properly restrained.
- Double demerit points apply for repeat mobile phone and seatbelt offences committed within a twelve (12) month period.

The cameras will be moved to multiple locations in urban and regional areas. Motorists should assume they can be caught anywhere, anytime.

QPS know the technology works thanks to the successful trial run last year when more than 2,200 drivers and front seat passengers were photographed not wearing seatbelts, and more than 15,000 drivers were caught using their mobile phones illegally.

A public education program is letting Queenslanders know about the cameras, with a major media campaign planned to link in with the introduction of penalties. TMR will be posting content via our StreetSmarts social media channels – Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram.

#### **Ratoon Stunting Disease**

With Ratoon Stunting Disease (RSD) starting to become prevalent across the district again (results from inspections conducted), this is a timely reminder of what to do to minimise RSD spread from a harvester.

Harvester hygiene pays dividends.

Below is a link to the SRA video on how to clean down a harvester. While the video focuses mainly on cleaning the harvester for movement between the sugar quarantine zones it is useful in providing a guide where to clean/wash the harvester to remove dirt and plant material before commencing to spray harvester/machinery with steriliser to control RSD.

Other tips to assist in reducing the spread include:

- Use only a clean approved seed source that has been inspected and tested prior to use.
- Spray down harvester and any other equipment whenever changing blocks or varieties. If this is not possible start harvesting the youngest block/ratoon, and therefore the cleanest cane, then move to the oldest, suspect, positive blocks last, then wash and sterilise machinery.

 Remember when planting cane to ensure the planting contractor has all cane removed from their equipment and it is sprayed with a steriliser. This includes harvester, haulouts and planter.
